The table was made by a great great uncle Standish and is very old. The clock was brought by covered wagons - ox ??? from Conn. to Illinois and the clock scared the Indians by clinking ?? eights (then the rest I cannot make out).

Ada Hubbell Hutchinson was born in Marinette WI. She is a descendant of Zachariah Standish. She was the daughter of William Hubbell and Lucy Howe. Lucy Howe's parents were William Howe and Polly Standish. Polly Standish's parents were Peleg Standish and Sarah Hamlen. Peleg Standish's parents were Zachariah Standish and Olive Pool. Zachariah Standish (1739-1780) marched from Plymouth at the Rhode Island Alarm in Capt. Thomas Sampson's company, Col. Thomas Lothrop's regiment.

Zachariah was the son of Dr. Zachariah Standish (1698-1770) and he in turn was the son of Ebenezer Standish (1672-1755) and he was the son of Alexander Standish (1625-1702) who was the son of Capt. Myles Standish - a Mayflower passenger - (1584-1656).
