

No history of contemporary Christian music is complete without a mention of the Myrrh Records label, established by Word Records to separate the contemporary Christian music (called Jesus Music at the time) from everything else they were releasing. **Larry Hubbell's band**, which never released again on the label or anywhere else, was the first album issued, MST-6500, and this is side one, cut one. The more common story is that the label was created for Randy Matthews, who had already recorded under the company's traditional Word Records label. This is from 1972, the same year of the first major Christian music festival, Explo '72, and a year after the Jesus Revolution made the cover of Time Magazine
