

Dear Sir:

I am writing you for a little advice in regard to making insect spray, the formula for which I got from you a short time ago.

Have been getting quotations on Pyrethrum and Pyretol. I wrote Leon Hirsh and Sons, and they referred me to W.T.Rawleigh Co., as Hirsh does not deal in insect powder etc., any more. Rawleigh quotes an extract in which he states that the active principle of 12 pounds of the flowers to the gallon, at 60%. Now according to your formula this could be diluted to make three gallons of spray to allow 2 pound of flowers to the gallon, which you state is about what Fly Tox contains.

Now, I have quotations from the Powell Co., and J. L. Hopkins, and their price is \$2.00 and \$2.25, and they advise diluting with three gallons of oil.


What I want to know is, is the extract of the Rawleigh Co., any good, or is it so inferior and cheap that a good product cannot be made from it? I could dilute it with just one gallon of oil and it would be cheaper than the other made with three. If I make a spray I want to make a good one, but I don't want to pay some company for their reputation if the one I can get cheaper is any good. Please give me an answer that would be what you would do if you were going to make the spray.

Also, I see that the Fenole company is putting out a spray scented with Lilac. I want to know if there is some scent, preferably a flower scent, not lilac though, that would be good to scent the spray and that would not cost much more than MethylSalicylate, yet would be pleasant, and different from others on the market?

I will thank you for advice on the above.
