

Copy of a letter from the Secretary of the Treasury, to the Hon. John Brown.

Treasury department March 8th 1791.  
Sir,

**I**N answer to your inquiry, I am to inform you, that the contract for the supply of articles in the Quarter Master's department was made with Mess. Elliot & Williams. That they are considered as the persons to whom the Government is responsible for all purchases of such articles (which include horses and other means of transportation) and are themselves answerable to the individual. That accordingly very liberal advances of money for all those purposes have been made to them; indeed to the full extent, in my opinion, of what would be, under the information possessed at the Treasury, justifiable; no accounts having been yet rendered in relation to the expenditures for the late expedition.

I stand ready the moment any balance shall satisfactorily appear, to be due, so pay it.

**F**ROM col. Alexander Hamilton's letter to the Hon. John Brown (published in this days paper) and from other information on the subject of advances of money by the public to Elliot & Williams, it will probably be inferred, that they have for some time withheld the money, from the people who have claims for pack horses. It therefore becomes necessary for Elliot & Williams, in order to defend themselves against unmerited censure, to state some facts, which will enable the people to judge of their conduct, and how far their integrity is chargeable in this business. — The following is a copy of the Estimate.

At the time this Estimate was laid before col. Hamilton, it appears, that independent of the pack horse claims, and leaving that out of the account altogether, that the public were in arrears with Elliot & Williams 11593 and 79 90th dollars, and that including the Estimate for pack horse claims, there ought to have been advanced 49863 and 79. 90th dollars, at which time the Secretary advanced to the agent of Elliot & Williams 15000 dollars, which leaves a balance to be paid of 34863 and 79 90th dollars, which is nearly the whole amount of the Estimate for pack horse pay, by which it must appear that the Secretary of the Treasury has either mistaken the sum due on the Estimate, or that the Estimate was not the rule of his conduct in making advances. — It has never been in the power of Elliot & Williams to draw money for articles furnished on the expedition, but by an Estimate produced to the Secretary, as no vouchers could ever yet be obtained to make up their accounts in the proper manner, and it is yet a matter of uncertainty whether or not they can be obtained at this time; as soon as that can be done, or the money drawn by any other means, the people may rest assured that there shall be no delay in discharging their claims but what is unavoidable.

LEXINGTON, April 9.

We are informed that a few weeks past, the Indians made an attack on a boat commanded by caps. — Hubble near the Scioto, they first attempted to board his boat in canoes filled with Indians, and were repulsed after a severe fire; in a second attempt they placed some white prisoners, so as to receive the fire of caps. Hubble if he persisted in defending himself, not intimidated by this manœuvre, he again repulsed them and the arms of both parties being discharged he defended himself with pieces of wood thrown at them, during their attacks so severe was the fire, that caps. Hubble had out of his boat company which consisted of 9 men, 3 killed 3 wounded and received himself a ball through his arm. — Too much praise cannot be given to the parties concerned in this manly and spirited defence, they have rendered an essential service to their country as well as themselves. — A few more instances of this kind, would check those daring savages who infest the Ohio, and efface from their minds, those impressions which a contrary conduct hath unhappily made, to the injury of many innocent and valuable citizens.

The same day in which caps. Hubble was attacked, a boat said to belong to — Greenhouse was taken by the Indians, without making any resistance.

A party of the Militia from Bourbon and Mason counties, have just returned from a tour up the Ohio above the Scioto, in their route they visited the ground near where the boat was attacked (mentioned in our last) where we are informed they found the dead bodies of 16 men out of the 17 missing (3 of the 20 having got in since our last) 2 women and a child; the women and child supposed to have been taken in Greenhouse's boat. They also found the bodies of 3 Indians, supposed to have been killed by caps. Hubble and his party, from their boat. The Indians were dispersed, and gone up the Scioto.

Last week the Indians killed a man near Kentucky river a, Benson, and likewise stole several horses.

We learn that the number of posts on our frontiers, for the defence of the district, are considerably augmented.





tering and amending such parts of  
our present constitution as should

## JOHN ALLEN GANO.

MORE than two hundred years ago—perhaps in 1685—when Roman intolerance drove the Huguenots from France, Francis Gano, a French Protestant, fled from his native country, to find a home in a strange land, settling with his family in Rochelle, New York. From this ancestry sprang the subject of the present sketch, John A. Gano, who was born at Georgetown, Ky., July 14, 1805.

His parents died before he reached the age of ten, leaving him to the care of an uncle, William Hubble, an old Indian fighter of early Kentucky days. Most of his education was received at Georgetown, Barton Stone being one of his instructors.

When he left school he turned his attention to the study of law, and was admitted to practice. As he manifested some talent as an orator, his future looked bright and promising.

In 1826, Mr. Gano was married to Mary Conn, of Centerville, Ky. Nine children were born to them, three of whom died in infancy. Six lived to maturity, to wit: William, Richard, Fannie, Franklin, John Allen, Jr., and Mary. Only two are living now—Richard, who is a preacher of the gospel, and John Allen.

In his youth, Mr. Gano was quick-tempered
