PLAN OF THE GENEALOGICAL EXCHANGE.

This paper is designed as a means for exchanging information among persons who desire genealogical material that is not accessible in the places where they reside. More persons than ever before are tracing lines of descent to prove their eligibility for patriotic societies, or are engaged in the more ambitious work of preparing family histories for publication. To aid these searchers, the GENEALOGICAL EXCHANGE will give especial attention to brief Queries and Answers. All material for this department will be published, as a rule, in the next number after it has been received. Readers who can answer Queries are urgently requested to do so. The information that they give with very little trouble to themselves will often be of much importance to those who receive it. And when those who give answers ask questions themselves, they will find others ready to be helpful to them. All statements must be strictly correct, for erroneous information, unless marked with a (?), is worse than none.

It is desirable for contributors to put at the end of their answers the sources at which their statements may be verified,

for instance, (Wills, Albany Co., N. Y.; Deeds, Cook Co., Ill.; Marriages, Dutch Church in New York City, 1639-1801; Family Bible; "Old Kittery and her Families," by Stackpole.) The editor intends to make this department more fruitful than those of many journals. She will not depend entirely on the chance of Queries being answered by some subscriber, but will make an effort to secure Answers, either by search herself or through Special Correspondents in other places. Persons living at county-seats who are willing to act as such Special Correspondents are invited to write the editor and find out if their counties are provided for.

The editor has found, as every genealogist does before going very far, that there are errors in many family histories that have been published. These mistakes are often copied by one writer from another and become widespread. Especial attention will be given in the EXCHANGE to correcting such errors.

Space will be given to partial family histories or material for genealogies, in order to put on record the work of investigators, and to attract the attention and arouse the interest of other members of the same families who may be able to co-operate in constructing a more complete record.
