The Richmond coal miners are at work again. During January they struck, but a compromise was effected. Last full the miners struck for 7 cents per bushel, they, previous to that having been getting 6 cents. After a weeks idleness, the operators "gave in" as they were in such a fix they could not resist. This continued several weeks, and the operato, a succeeded in extricating themseives from a very bad box, and they gave the miners notice that after such a date only 6 cents would be paid, as they could not afford any more. minera struck, but after holding out a week or more, a compromise was effected whereby the difference was split, and all works in harmony now, the minexs receiving 656 cents per bushel.

The first strike was for 6 cents, which the operators paid for awhile. On the 10th of January, notice was given by the operators, of a reduction of the price digging to 5 cents per bushel. A strike was the result which is not yet been settled. One mine that of Meson Hubble & Co., compromised on 5%, which they are paying, but the other operators are only paying 5 cents but have not their full compliment of hand.
