Says she remembers that very young and small she was seized at the gate of a large white house, which she supposes was her home, and a hand placed over her mouth to keep her from making any outcry or noise; that with the band of Gypies, by whom she was taken, she led for some time, yearsdoes not know how long-a roving life. Went to many places with them, none of which she can recall. She has an idea that her mother's Christian name was Marietta and her surname Hubble. She says the Gypsies treated her cruelly: that when their children misbehaved they would say she did it, and be switched

they did at first, closely night and day, being out at play with the children, she ran off, hoping to find her home, but was again picked up by another band of this tribe, or another one, who now and finen would leave her with some family, and after a while call again for her.
