of Exemption, when they were given their final instructions and provided with cigarettes, tobacco and other articles that will be of use to them. At 5:30 yesterday afternoon the young men were guests of the city at a supper given at Crosdale's Cafe, where they were regaled with good things to eat and made to feel at home.
