Monday morning impressive funeral services were held at the Hubble church, of which he was a member. The services were conducted by Elder F. M. Tinder after which all that was mortal was laid to rest. Mr. Hubble is survived by his wife, who before her marriage was Miss Anderson, and one child who have the sympathy of all in this dark hour.

Deceased was a brother of Senator R. L. Hubble, of Stanford, L. F. Hubble, of Somerset and Mrs. M. B. Eubanks, of Danville.

News of the death of Mr. Mack B. Eubanks was received last Wednesday morning. Mr. Eubanks went to Hot Springs several weeks ago in hopes of regaining his health, but the trip did not benefit him. On the other hand, he lost strength constantly and was unable to return home. The deceased was one of the most widely known farmers in Central Kentucky, as well as one of the most successful.
