Mr. and Mrs. John M. Hubble received a telegram Tuesday afternoon that their son, Sergeant John Wiley Hubble was critically ill in at Fort Bliss, El Paso, Texas. His father left at once for his bedside, but before he reached there another telegram was received by the family that he was dead. "Wiley" as he was familiarly known here gave his life to his country when barely old enough to enlist and had been loyal and true for the past fifteen years or more. He was sent to the Mexican border when the trouble broke out there, and there contracted that dread disease, dysentery, to which he succumbed about two o'clock Wednesday afternoon, October 18. The remains were brought here and after funeral services at the home, were laid to rest in Buffalo Springs cemetery with Masonic honors, to which grand lodge he belonged. The large concourse of friends who assembled to pay the last tribute of respect to the noble young man attest in some degree the esteem in which he was held. The tenderest sympathy of this entire community goes out to the crushed and broken hearted father, mother, and sisters and may they find comfort in their heavenly Father who "knows it all and doeth all things for the best."
