Mr William G. Hubble, after a short illness of grip, which finally attacked the brain, breathed his last Friday, just after noon. He was the only son of the late Levi Hubble since whose death he has been the tuainstay of a devoted mother and two lovely sisters, Misses Alice and Laura, and who are now bowled down with an overwhelming grid at his loss. Religious, moral, honorable and hightoned he was well thought of by all who knew him and sincerely loved by those more intimate with his real worth and manly nature. A man of fine physique, with no hereditary taint of disease, and with a handsome, open countenance, Will Hubble was the picture of health and his life promised to be a long and useful one, but God moves in a mysterious way His wonders to perform, and at the age of 25 he is taken from home and friends.
