# DIES IN CAPITAL

---

**Best Known Here as Colonel  
of 201st New York  
Volunteers.**

**FOUGHT AT GETTYSBURG**

---

**Had Been in Ill Health for  
Months, but End Is Due  
to Heart Trouble.**

---

The funeral of Gen. Henry Wilson Hubbell, U. S. A., retired, who died at his home in Chevy Chase, Washington, late Saturday night, will be held this afternoon at 3 o'clock with military honors. Interment will be in Arlington Cemetery. Besides immediate relatives residing in New York a number of former associates in the army and intimate friends from here will attend the funeral services.

While Gen. Hubbell, who was 76 years old, had been in ill health for many months, news of his death nevertheless was a severe shock to his thousands of friends in this city and throughout the State. The immediate cause was an attack of heart trouble. The officer was known best here, not as Gen. Hubbell, but as Col. Hubbell of the 201st New York Volunteers, who helped to make history during the Spanish-American war.

Gen. Hubbell was born in this city, and at the outbreak of the civil war was a member of the old Seventh Regiment, State Militia. He was among those who answered President Lincoln's first call for volunteers, and shortly afterward, at the age of 19 years, was commissioned a Lieutenant, serving throughout the war. He was in the battle of Gettysburg, where he was mentioned in despatches.

After the war Lieut. Hubbell was commissioned in the Regular Army, and during the Spanish-American war was made a Colonel. The 201st New York Volunteers, the regiment which he commanded, was made up principally of New Yorkers, all of whom loved and honored their leader.

He was married to the daughter of Gen. John T. Sprague and is survived by four children, Edith Sprague Hubbell, Henry Wilson Hubbell, Jr., Mrs. Margaret Woodruff, the wife of Col. J. A. Woodruff, now serving in France, and Reginald Hubbell.

Gen. Hubbell was a member of the Society of Colonial Wars, Sons of the American Revolution, Loyal Legion, Army and Navy Club and the Fauquier Club of Warrenton, Va.
