

Huns Face U. S.

Camera In Attack On Chateau-Thierry

London, Eng., Oct. 14.—Apropos the new American official war film which was shown privately here and which is about to be generally circulated—called "America's Answer to the Huns"—a good story is told, says the Evening Standard.

Some months ago a well known film expert, Edgar B. Hatrick, was commissioned by the U. S. A. department of public information to proceed to France to prepare a film showing the operation of the American army in the fighting zone. Accompanied by his assistant, **Joseph Hubble**, Mr. Hatrick was at the American headquarters at the time the Germans made their first serious onslaught on Chateau-Thierry.

When orders came through for two American divisions to go forward to defend Chateau-Thierry, the news flashed around headquarters. Mr. Hatrick, **Mr. Hubble** and a staff officer set off post haste in a fast car to the scene of action.

Indeed, they established such a speed record that they reached Chateau-Thierry some hours ahead of the American advance guard, and the most formidable machine facing the Germans in that particular locality while they carried out their preliminary shelling of Chateau-Thierry was an American cinematograph camera, which if it did not operate towards checking the boche advance, at least faithfully recorded the full effect of German shell fire.
