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## Membership . . .

Since 1981-2 when Society membership was 158, it has grown steadily to 360 now. This is great progress and thanks are due both to Leroy Hubble's leadership, and the hard work of the Membership Committee. Certain committee members who undertook special mailings deserve a lot of praise too!

It's sad, however, that some members from past years didn't renew in 1986. With them, the total would have been 400, well on the way to a "self-supporting" 650 members which it is figured would about enable the Society to take over most of the secretarial functions still underwritten by Ernest Hubbell.

He continues to allow Susie McDonald, his personal secretary and Society Corresponding Secretary, to do a lot of important Society work which rightfully should be done by members. The Society will be hard-pressed to cope with all the jobs she does, and to finance proposed projects, unless there is more participation in committee activities and larger income from needed increased membership.



## Your President's Report . . .

Dear Cousins,

This message comes with five months left to finalize plans for our Biennial at Flagstaff Arizona featuring a visit to the Hubbell Trading Post at Ganado. Many of us will meet at Flagstaff to review and reassess our Society's progress and program, elect new officers and set new goals. At the same time we will be seeing a piece of beautiful America, visiting a Hubbell attraction and enjoying fellowship - a very special fellowship of family cousins from all over America and Canada. If you haven't previously attended a Biennial and can arrange things, the time is May 27-30 1987. Try it! I'm confident you'll like it!

The past year has seen the successful conclusion of the reprint of the 1980 *History*, satisfying the present and immediate future needs of our membership in this regard. We have also seen the addition of one hundred or so new members which is an impressive percentage increase but still short of the total membership needed to put us on a fully self-sustaining basis from dues alone. We have added some new workers from our membership, and reactivated some former working ones, but need more to make a major impact on our programs!

There are perhaps 10,000 or so non-member Hubbells from which to draw members, and there are many present members with the talents needed to carry out our Society's programs. The continuing shortfall of membership and active involvement is frustrating! Finding, motivating and organizing willing workers to get jobs done from our scattered membership remains our No. 1 challenge.

To me, a Hubble was always someone special, not because we were rich or famous or specially talented, but probably primarily because in my travels I found Hubbells to be very few and far-between. With the subsequent discovery that 'ells, 'les and 'els are all the same, descendants of one Richard Hubball, I consider it even more special. Evidently many Hubbells do not share this feeling or do not consider family ties important or do not really comprehend our unique Hubble family relationship and heritage. I would like to believe the latter is the case and if I am correct, the Society's growth and success will largely come through better communication of that message and the resulting active heritage pursuit.

## FAMILY TOUR TO ENGLAND. . .

The owner of a company offering tours for families interested in visiting their "ancestral home" enquired whether Hubbells would wish to form a special group for a 10-day tour to England.

One could be organized for the last week of May 1988, flying from New York to London. The group would spend its first night at a Heathrow Airport hotel before leaving the next morning by bus for the English midlands to visit Ribbesford, Rock, Bewdley and Ipsley where our family has its ancient roots. Plans include visits to other picturesque towns and historical places, possibly Stonehenge, Salisbury and Stratford.

The cost would be about \$1,800 each person - air fare from point of origin to London and return would be extra. The cost will largely depend upon the number of persons who join the tour if it is formed. The fee includes lodging, bus transportation and guide, a full English breakfast each morning (!) dinners while out of London and some luncheons. We would expect to spend about 4 days in the Rock-Ribbesford area, visiting these villages with Hubbell significance. It is expected special events will be organized by residents in the area for our group. Return to London for the last 3 days will permit sightseeing and shopping there.

By the time our 1987 biennial reunion in Flagstaff rolls around, we will have firmer details. In the meantime, family members might want to think about the chance to wander narrow English roads and lanes, see some of the old buildings our ancestors knew, gaze on the rolling fields and imagine what emotions they must have had as they left all this behind for the long and hazardous trip to New England.

## HISTORY & BIOGRAPHY

### A FEW CAUGHT THOUGHTS

*Judith Puckett writes a regular column by this title for the Wayne County Press of Fairfield, Illinois. Rae Hubbell(7889), Member of the Society, is Enquiring Reporter for the newspaper. Judith is the daughter of Society member Wanda Hubble Puckett(7383). These two samples are typical of her unique, family-oriented writing. Every branch should have someone like Judith to preserve glimpses of its family from times long gone in such moving prose.*

### "The Kingdom of the Heart"

The first family reunion photograph we have was taken during the 1930s in the northeast corner of the frontyard. There are thirty Hubbles, by blood or marriage, bunched together in the late afternoon sun.

I know or knew most of the people in the picture except for a few who died before I was born. But even those people seem real since I have heard about them all my life.

These same people still come together twice a year at the same house for a reunion. The front row of the 1930s photograph is of an uneven array of children who have now grown up to be on the back row, behind their own children and grandchildren.

I think, aside from the fact that the family is mine, it is worth some notice that some families persist through the generations in a relatively cohesive, supportive way. In a society and world that is fragmented and uncertain, the idea of "family" gets too easily limited to whether or not one husband and wife can stay together. The definition seems too often to stop at one generation.

I don't pretend to know why some families maintain a bond through the generations when so many others can not. But I do notice in an unscientific observation that there was a time in American history, in our own local history, that spawned a particularly bonded kind of family.

I speak of the pioneer families. They dotted every frontier in the United States at one time or another. The Hubbles were one of them. There were countless others in these parts as well.

These were the settlers, the ones who, instead of passing through, stayed to plant the orchards, build the houses, raise the cattle and claim miles of country for make-shift civilization.

They had kids. Generally lots of them.

As the world of tintype gradually disappeared into the Kodak, with all the social changes each implies, these families persisted.

Oh, they scattered. Children went to Nebraska or the Southwest or other places. It wasn't that the families lived together. Not at all.

In fact the only visible difference might be the reunion that inevitably occurred once or twice a year when nearly everyone tried to make it to the homeplace for a visit.

What is the nature of the bond in, for instance, the Hubbles that brings dozens of descendants back "home" once or twice a year? Common experiences? The huge table of food?



Memories? Good stories and laughter?

I don't really think I know, except for myself.

I have been to nearly every Hubble reunion since I was an infant. I can't imagine being anywhere else on the sacred second Sunday in August.

That is where, quite simply, I belong.

We are, like the descendants of the other pioneer families, really quite ordinary people, most of the time. But there is some intangible difference that is the echo to the laughter, the extra moment in the hug, the caught tear in the smiling eyes.

We are a family who has been together a long time. We have been through a lot. We are always at home with each other.

Nearly every reunion we try to take a group picture. There are so many of us that we have to divide into two groups generally. It is a hassle on hot August days. But we generally persist. And nearly always we take the group pictures in the same spot in the yard--the northeast corner.

I think about that sometimes when I am standing in a row of wise-cracking cousins and we are squinting toward the cameras in the hot sun. So many times the Hubbles have stood in this spot. So many years.

This year we expect about seventy-five or so. They will come in from Texas, Arizona, Georgia and a dozen other spots closer. There will be a prayer at noon and then the continuous eating begins for the rest of the day. Kids will play at the barn. Adults will relax and then have some more pie. The afternoon will be a slow weaving of the past and present.

We are the lucky ones. For one afternoon twice a year in spite of our individual shortcomings and the frailty of the world, we are in a private kingdom of the heart.

We are where we belong.



## "The Old Black Hat"

Once upon a time, not so terribly long ago, there was a man who got a black felt hat (Ora J. Hubble, 5982).

Whether it was a present, or he bought the hat himself, I couldn't say. But I know he was a hat man since he hadn't much hair on the top of his head and it got sunburned or cold.

The hat arrived in the days when fine headgear came in firm cardboard boxes. Inside them, after the string was carefully untied, was the hat, hidden in a glaze of tissue paper.

Black as a barn at midnight, smooth skinned to the touch, peaked just right in the front, and encircled by a wide, formal shiny hatband, it was spiffy headgear.

The man first wore the hat carefully. Perhaps to Sunday church and weekly prayer meetings. But not to work. Not to the dusty wallpaper store. And not on the many errands and trips he did around town as mayor.

For several years, the formal, warm hat was a regular choice pulled from his small stable of headgear. Fairly often it dotted the landscape as he appeared.

Then there were newer hats.

Gifts, maybe. Or impulse purchases.

The old black felt hat retired into daily wear in less formal places. It sat in the back of the store dangerously close to the wallpaper paste. It topped his head when he spaded the garden. He wore it right through the low-hanging leaves and branches as he picked apples.

And the hat turned brownish. The numberless times he grabbed the crown to take off the hat wore a hole in the peak. Then another rip grew further back along the crease.

Gradually the man began using the hat altogether for chores. In fact, he hung it on a nail in the workshed permanently ready for fall, winter and spring work in the yard.

The hat, when new, was worn by a man in his prime. By the time it found its way to the nail in the shed, he was older, and thinking of retirement from business and small town politics.

Still going strong, he retired to raise a slew of eleven hives of bees in his backyard. And he planted unusual varieties of fruit and border trees. He traveled and researched family history. He puttered in a privately busy and productive world.

And the older he got, the more often he operated with a herd of frazzle-haired youngsters bobbing, darting and buzzing in the yard around him. As these grandchildren grew, the man molded his part of their characters quietly.

The way a father gently holds a child as it begins to walk. So gently the child believes it walks by itself. Support without claim. Intense love hung on a wry smile.

Finally, his own measure worn and used up, the man died. And his friends and family, particularly the youngsters with their hair slicked and parted, mourned him. Mourn him still. And the citizens of the town where he was mayor and merchant missed him.

And the world was without one exceptionally good, unusual man. His accomplishments and dreams, as will ours, melted into the changes of the future.

But the old hat hung still where he had notched it on the nail in the shed. Long after the mourning turned toward remembrance, it hung there. Until one of the youngsters, taller and older now, reached up in the old shed and pulled down a gray-brown hat from off a nail.

The old hat was lumpish, torn, dirty. The young woman patted the hat and thick dust fogged the air. She knocked off a mud dauber's nest from the crown. As if dust were magician's sparkle, there was the man again.

To look at the hat was to see the man. The workshed whispered of beehives and laughter, apple trees and popcorn evenings. Remember the wild trip to Nebraska? Remember the reunions with soda pop in ice-filled water troughs? Remember how the smile crept out of the eyes? The shed, the woman, and the hat sang old songs.

And the woman took the hat home and kept it.

Then one day, much later and for other reasons, the young woman read in a book about a tribe of Indians. They lived long before the hat was made, before the man was born, before the land felt the footfall of Europeans. These Indians believed that the human spirit exists as long as the memory of a person is passed along.

They felt the stories about great people keep the spirits of those people alive. As well as the goodness of them. Until gradually either the person fades away as the stories die, or instead becomes nearly immortal. An immortality woven as the stories and memories are shared one generation to the next.

I am the woman with the book and the hat. And I wonder if that is why I took grandpa's old black felt hat off the nail and brought it home. To hang in my study. In some small way, an immortality hat.

Some lives, some examples are worth passing along. Some stories need to be given like a piece of gold, as inheritance. So I guess the hat is a story. In fact it is a thousand stories, a thousand threads to weave together for the next buch of frazzle-haired kids. Buzzing through the next yard.

Back when I was one of those kids, I thought grandpa would live forever.

I guess now, in a way, he does.





## Ruth Hubbell Celebrates 100th Birthday

*Ruth Ryan sent this clipping about her relative, Ruth Louise Hubbell (a137iii) . It's noteworthy not only for the subject but for the reporter's inability to spell our name right very often.*

The weekend in Amelia County was typical for most folks. Many continued the summer practice of avoiding the heat. Saturday afternoon was a special time, however, to one Amelia resident. Joined by her friends, Ruth Hubbell celebrated her 100th birthday.

Now a resident of the Sunset View Home near Lodore, Miss Hubbell has been enjoying the cards and letters which have been received from over a dozen states. A special greeting, which she proudly shows first, was sent by President and Mrs. Reagan.

Asked why she's been able to live for a century, Miss Habbell exclaims "I've been told that the Lord won't have me." Her sly smile shows that there is still a little mischief present.

Ruth Habbell was born August 2, 1886, in the small town of Charlotte, Vermont. It was there she was raised, the youngest of three children born to Fayette Hubbell and his wife Gertrude Peck Hubbell.

Growing up in the 1890's, Miss Hubbell's playtime was spent mainly with dolls, doll dishes, "little chairs, and a little stove," she remembers. Since her brothers were 8 and 9 years older than she, much of her time was spent playing alone. "I had no one to play with, so I entertained myself." She does recall a favorite rocking horse.

Ruth's grandmother and maiden Aunt Lovisa lived on the adjoining property, so the young girl spent much of her time there. "They lived in a big old tavern," she tells. "The house had a giant ballroom with two fireplaces on each end."

Although she doesn't recall all the details, Ruth says there were lots of old stories about the tavern, some involving bags of gold and the "underground chamber of the house."

"Someone in the old days had a willow whip that he used on his horse... he stuck the whip into the ground, and it rooted and grew into that huge old willow tree in the yard."

Miss Habbell has fond memories of the farmlands where she romped as a child, then over 150 acres just across Lake Champlain. Her heritage, however, was not without tragedy.

"Father had two brothers and two sisters," she explains. "There was an epidemic of diphtheria going around in those days." Only her father and her Aunt 'Visa' survived the catastrophe. "The old folks would tell me about the young men in the neighborhood using farm sleds to bury the dead in the neighborhood."

Before the days of the automobiles, horses were very important, Ruth remembers. "The fields were worked with teams of young horses," she tells. "My father taught me how to handle horses...I never was afraid to use a whip on them. If I wanted to go somewhere, I had to take a horse and a carriage."

Ruth had a special horse that was her pet. This horse had to be put to sleep before she left Charlotte, Vermont. "I just loved Dolly...she was a beautiful animal." She laughs about a time when Dolly was loaned to a neighbor. "Dolly got real homesick and nearly dragged the man back to our house... his hat a-flying!"

"I love a woodstove and I love kerosene lamps," she says proudly, but warns "Don't you dare tell anybody, or they'll think I'm a lunatic." She likes the heat from a woodstove, claiming that winters in Virginia are colder than those in Vermont.

"It's a dry cold in Vermont, but it's a wet and damp cold in Virginia. It's really hard to get warm in Virginia."

Miss Habbell recalls the deep snows of her childhood. "Sometimes the snow would be up to my window...the men would have to get out the horses to break out the roads."

She doesn't care too much for thunderstorms now, but was really afraid of them as a child.

Lightning struck and burned several of the outbuildings on the farm. "Aunt Lovisa used to say that I shouldn't worry about the lightning...she said if it hits you, it will cure your arthritis."

There were no telephones around during Ruth's childhood. How was help summoned? "If you needed help, you would put a lamp or a lantern in your window," she explains. "At night the neighbors would see it and would come to see how they could help you."

During her days in Vermont, days started earlier than they do in Amelia. "My father went to bed at seven o'clock and got up at four o'clock to tend the cows...the cows had to get some fuel inside of them to warm them up."

Ruth didn't mind cooking on the woodstove; in fact, she prefers it even today. She claims that she wasn't good at cooking when she was young, but her mother would say the food was "good" just to give her encouragement.

"I love a good old-fashioned beef soup cooked on a woodstove in an iron kettle...and none of those old vegetables in it, either," she scoffs.

"I used to like to make apple pies. There's nothing better than an apple pie from a woodstove," she tells. "But I won't hear of using cinnamon...folks should know that nutmegs should be used for apples--not cinnamon!:"

When asked what is her favorite meal today, Ruth thinks a minute, then answers. "I like a potato baked in the oven, and I like a piece of fried steak."

Miss Habbell recalls friends who went off to World War I and never came back. Her teenage years were spent "mostly around the old folks," including her Aunt Lovisa.

"Aunt Lovisa would say to me, 'You and I never had any young life,'" remembers Ruth Habbell. "But I was happy."

"And I'd be right glad to be back in it right now."

## Hubbell Ballooning

*Member of the Society, Harvey Hubbell IV (5715) has been an ardent balloonist for some years. Reports of his interesting exploits have appeared in various newspapers including The New York Times and the Newtown Bee. The following commentary which seemed particularly informative which was written by Sando Bologna, appeared in "The Sunday Republican Magazine" of Waterbury Connecticut for April 21 1985.*

"HERE'S HOW I GOT interested in it. When I saw a 500 zlotys bill, it had the portrait of an American Revolutionary hero, Kosciuszko."

Harvey Hubbell IV, of Newtown, Connecticut was recalling, how last June (1984) , while examining Polish currency on a visit to Poland, he conceived the idea for 'Mission Kosciuszko.'

The 55-year-old aeronaut and his 26-year-old son, Harvey V, had traveled with their balloon from Paris to Lodz, Poland, in a Volkswagen mini-bus to participate in an international hot-air balloon competition. The father had entered the balloon, Chanticleer, in the meet.

"I soon found out that Thaddeus Kosciuszko is the most respected individual in the Polish



Republic," said Hubbell as he reviewed plans to honor Kosciuszko as "the hero of two worlds--a unique figure in the history of Poland and America."

A balloon, reasoned Hubbell, is a striking means of exciting the emotions of people. "It's a fine medium for a people-to-people program."

He began considering a free-floating hot-air balloon salute to Kosciuszko in the United States areas where the Polish hero served as a colonel of engineers in the American Revolution and at Polish sites where he is honored by memorials to him as the leader in the 1794 Kosciuszko Uprisings.

Hubbell's son videotaped scenes of their 10-day journey in Poland. They have been edited into a 20-minute video-cassette documentary with a commentary by the elder Hubbell about his perception of the mutual respect between Americans and Poles. Polish rock music is played as background.

After returning to Newtown, Hubbell conferred with American government and military officials who endorsed his plans for "Mission Kosciuszko." He also conferred with Polish government representatives in this country and returned to Warsaw in February where he met Brig. Gen. Wladyslaw Hermaszewski, president of the Aero Club of the Polish People's Republic, who obtained Polish government approval for the ceremonial good will flights in Poland.

Said Hubbell: "The Poles are interesting people. We want to take a balloon where it is unfamiliar and we want to show them who we (Americans) are. My perception is that we have cultural ties, and we have distortions on both sides."

Hubbell has received endorsement for his mission from the National Aeronautic Association. He has pledged to pay the cost of the nylon balloon, called Balloon Thaddeus Kosciuszko, being built in Bristol, England. It will be 90 feet high and, when inflated, will hold 90,000 cubic feet of hot air. It will be shipped by jet to this country as an experimental balloon.

Hubbell, who benefits from a trust of the Hubbell family, will also pay the cost of the balloon flights in both countries. His enthusiasm for the project has been soaring as he supervises the artwork which will be placed on the balloon in the Sky High Art Studio, Excelsior, Minn. The art consists of a 20-foot portrait of Kosciuszko, a blowup of the Medal of the Society of Cincinnati awarded for Kosciuszko's services as an officer in the American Revolution, a large copy of the Polish Medal of Virtuti Militari, in recognition of his service at the Battle of Dubienka in 1792, the Eagle of Poland's heraldry, and the heraldic American Eagle.

Hubbell, a director of the New England Air Museum, Windsor Locks, who began ballooning in 1979 after the death of his wife, Jeanne, said he expects to receive corporate support and contributions from individuals and groups. Movies for television will be taken in both countries. Extensive coverage is expected from the press, radio, and television.

He has designed a special commemorative Kosciuszko Mission glass plate which will be presented to hosts at the ceremonial flight stops.

Hubbell is convinced that the goodwill mission will be his most exciting air mission. He piloted a balloon over the Bristol Memorial Day parade. He was the first American to launch a hot-air balloon over Annonay, France, in 1981. He flew a balloon over the Washington Mall after President Ronald Reagan's inauguration in 1981. He was the coordinator of the Bicentennial of Ballooning by the Balloon Federation of America in four European countries.

On May 23, Hubbell will welcome to Newtown two Polish aeronauts-- one from Poznan, the other from Bialystok-- who will co-pilot Balloon Kosciuszko in this country and in Poland. The visitors will be introduced to Kathy Boland of Farmington, and experienced balloonist, who will be the American co-pilot with Hubbell.

The first ceremonial flight will take place May 28 or 29 over the National Park Service Battlefield at Saratoga, N. Y., where Kosciuszko set up the key defensive positions that resulted in the first major victory of the American forces in September 1777. Kosciuszko was a young artillery captain in the Polish Army when he volunteered for the American Revolution. A native of the Duchy of Lithuania, he had trained in military science in Poland, England, France, and Germany.

The balloon's next stop will be West Point, N. Y., where Kosciuszko spent 28 months as senior engineer in building the major American fortifications in the Hudson River Valley. A balloon ascension is proposed at the U. S. Military Academy parade grounds, near the statue honoring the Polish patriot.

Next air visit will be at Ninety-Six, N. C. to commemorate Kosciuszko's service as a fighting officer and strategist in the American recapture of Charleston. On Oct. 13, 1783, the Polish officer was awarded American citizenship by Congress, given a land grant, and advanced to brigadier general. He returned to Poland the next year.

The fourth ceremonial site will be at the Thomas Jefferson Home at Monticello, Va., commemorating the visit that Kosciuszko made to Vice-President Jefferson in 1798. The Polish patriot had been released from the war prison at St. Petersburg, Russia. From Monticello, he returned to France to write his memoirs and continued to petition European rulers in behalf of a free Poland. He died in Solothurn, Switzerland, in 1817, and is buried in Wawel Palace, Krakow, in the company of other Polish heroes.

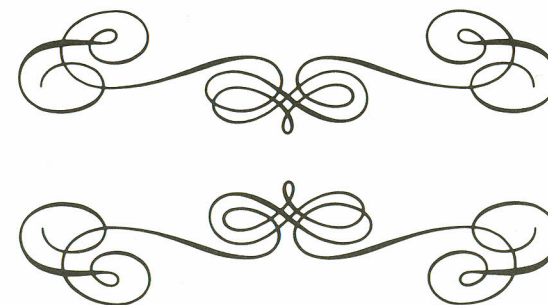
Hubbell hopes to get approval soon for the four ceremonial sites in Poland in late June. The first ascension would be either at Wawel Palace in Krakow or at a commemorative 100-foot high mound outside the city which contains soil from all the battlefields where Kosciuszko served, including the American ones. Kosciuszko became the supreme commander of Polish forces in Krakow March 24, 1794, where the Kosciuszko Uprising was spawned.

The second launching in Poland would be in Raclawice where Kosciuszko led peasants in routing the Russian forces in 1794. "The battle proved the combat value of the freed serfs and ignited the fervor of the Polish people in the cause of the insurrection", said Hubbell.

The third visit is expected to be in Wroclaw, Poland's large industrial city, where Hubbell and his colleagues will visit a building where there is a displayed a painting the size of a football field which depicts Kosciuszko and his peasants charging the Russians at Raclawice. The painting was done in 1894, damaged in World War I and II, and hung in a modern building last year by Polish soldiers.

The final launching is planned in Warsaw where patriotic ceremonies will be held, climaxed with Hubbell presenting *Balloon Kosciuszko* to the Aero Club of Poland as a gift.

"The Poles will bring the balloon to Battle Creek, Mich., in July for the World Hot-Air Balloon Championship," said Hubbell.
