THE NINTH HFHS BIENNIAL IN REVIEW

The room was the largest and nicest room we have enjoyed for a Hospitality Room, and easily accommodated a number of round tables upon which a variety of displays had been set up. Publication of this book is anticipated to be completed by the next biennial reunion.

We sent E-mail messages to Hubbells who were unable to attend, and received replies from some of them before the banquet on Saturday night, where they were read to the group. 

The first family meeting took place on Wednesday and HFHS president Harold G. Hubbell introduced the Mayor of Springfield, the Honorable Lee Gannaway, who welcomed the Hubbell Family to the city. wife Madalene would be attending to participate in the placing of Society materials in a time capsule which will be placed in the burying ground near Hubble Hill. The committee chairs next reported to the family on their respective committees' activities since the last biennial. The afternoon's separate committee meetings got a lot of necessary family business accomplished, and then we were on our own for dinner. This gave everyone an

opportunity to get together with some cousins they wanted to get to know better and chat at their leisure.

On Thursday we boarded buses to the College of the Ozarks, a work study school—one of only 5 in the country which a student can attend without any tuition at all in exchange for work on the campus. In the lovely chapel with stained glass

windows, we gathered to listen to two of the student residents explain the philosophy of the school and the role of work in each student's life there. A thunderstorm prevented us from entering the beautiful nursery greenhouses that contained flowers for sale, much to the disappointment of some of the family who had their eyes on orchid plants, among others. We went to the "Friendship House" and had lunch there, served by students who made and served the meal as part of their work experience related to food service and hotel management. The students perform all the labor on the extensive campus, up to and including constructing the lovely stone buildings. Each student gains wide experience in the real world before graduating in one of a variety of fields. The Ralph Foster Museum is well known as the "Smithsonian of the Ozarks". The variety of subjects was amazing, and there was really something there for everyone. We had three floors of exhibits to explore and exclaim over, and several people were heard to say "We had one of those in the house when I was a child..."

In the afternoon we visited Branson, where we took in a show at the Moon River Theater featuring Andy Williams. It was beautifully presented, and we were all pleasantly surprised at the still strong and melodious quality of Andy's voice, despite his many years singing on

stage. We were also happy to see Rosella Hansen and her family join us for the show. Her determination and pride in being a Hubbell continue to impress us at each reunion.

Friday's meetings gave the family a chance to learn what had happened in the individual committee meetings, and to meet the new officers for the next biennium. Your board of directors made a number of decisions and plans, which will keep the Society strong and growing well into the new century. The site of the next biennial reunion was voted upon from the suggestions submitted to the board, and the announcement of the site was made at the Saturday night banquet.

On Saturday it was back to the buses again to go to the General Sweeny Museum of Civil War History and then on to the Wilson's Creek National Battlefield. While walking

around the Ray Farmhouse site at the battlefield, it was easy to imagine the soldiers coming across the fields, and picture the devastation after the battle there. The docent at the Museum we had just visit put some dramatically graphic pictures of war, medicine, the economy and the Civil War period in our minds, and for a while it was not difficult to imagine some of the privations the family suffered long after the battle.

We next ventured to the Bass Pro Shops where we could browse, shop, or simply eat a very tasty lunch at Hemingway's Restaurant. Leaving there, we went on to Marshfield, MO where the city and county officials were assembled on the town square, awaiting our arrival. The City Administrator Dan McMillan welcomed the family to Marshfield, and read the Proclamation he had prepared for

us. In it he proclaimed, "Now therefore, it is altogether fitting and proper that the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen of the City of Marshfield, Missouri do hereby proclaim that June 12, 1999 be forever know as Edwin Powell Hubble Day." We couldn't help but observe that almost everyone there had a camera, and indeed it was hard to take a picture of anyone who was not taking a picture of someone else, or of the remarkable copy of the space telescope mounted high above the lawn of the town square. John Haywood, one of the county commissioners, took the official group photograph for us.

Once we finished our picture taking, we were all welcomed in the shade of tree on the grounds of the Webster County Historical Society for lemonade and cookies, made by the members of the Society.

Committee Begins "Hubbell Wives Project"

A new genealogy project is under way with the guidance of the Genealogy Committee (GenCom) and most of it is taking place on the Internet. After years of doing genealogy, several Hubbell women noted little change in the way the male's surname determines the way family history and genealogy are studied and recorded; but obviously half of every Hubbell child is produced by another line. (Almost always.) The group felt a need to learn more about the elusive females in our early Hubbell generations to produce a clearer picture of the development of the Hubbell line.

In early January 1999 after several random e-mail conversations, four HFHS members put their heads together and considered studying the Hubbell wife, her parents and her grandparents as a family cluster to provide yet another perspective on each Hubbell male. Conferring with Hilbert Hubble, the Family Genealogist, Marjorie Hubbell Gibson, Mary Ann Hubbell, Barbara Kruse, Carol Hubbell Boggs and eventually Kathy Gasaway and Bertie Herman started discussing what it would be like to arrange material on Richard Hubball's mother, and the wives of the first three generations of Hubbells using the "A&R" numbers and the name of the husband as a reference point, and build a three generation pedigree based on the wife, or wives of that Hubbell.

The fact that the team members were located in Utah, Long Island, Cape Cod, North Carolina, Texas, and Connecticut did not seem to affect anyone's enthusiasm. There were obvious logistical problems in the first place, because genealogies don't go up in standard Register, or modified Register, or TAG formats, they ordinarily go down. So it was necessary to devise a way to follow the A&R num-

bers, then once arriving at the wife, reverse course and go back up through her pedigree but still stay within a traditionally recognizable format for clarity and ease of understanding. That took about a week to work out, and once on paper it looked very different from the usual Register report.

That led to a graphic representation, or a pedigree chart, showing the relationship of the six individuals to the Hubbell wife. Once that was established it was a simple matter to follow the conventional numbering of the pedigree, 1(wife), 2(wife's father), 3(wife's mother), etc. Now the traditional format could be applied and make sense in the new context. Soon the shape of the printed format became clear and Mary Ann compiled a list of wives' names with known parents to divide up and research, and the team was off and running.

It was surprising to learn how much research could be accomplished through the Web utilizing the various surname pages, newslists and so on. People who were willing to do "lookups" for the team were contacted through the Web, and the information started coming together. Mary Ann and Marjorie were fortunate to have access to excellent genealogical libraries and other sources, and Barbara had developed a number of sources over the years with her own research. The rest of us frequented the many web sites that we found to be full of the information the project required. We found that many of

the old records are being clarified and expanded upon, and almost daily, new books are being published on the old well-known colonial names. In just the past few years, the amount of material available for research has grown immensely.

Stratford, CT is the central location for much of the early Hubbell family activity, but it has been very interesting to see how many places the various wives and their families came from. Because of the concentration of Hubbells in one place, the group felt that it would be interesting to the reader to be able to see through maps of the time, where these early families actually lived. Once the "Hubbell Wives" got well under way, it became clear that there was a book in the material, and so the group will be presenting a proposal to support publication of the book to the HFHS at the Family Meeting at the 1999 reunion in Springfield. If the proposal is accepted, the book should be finished this summer and will be used to provide income for the HFHS. Several copies will be produced as a first run, and will be available to preview in the Hospitality Room at the reunion. The index alone should make for fascinating reading. However the printing turns out, the project has been one whose time has come.

The Hubbell Wives have become exciting and fascinating, and even in the midst of the work on the first three chapters, there were occasional comments such as "Perhaps we could work on the fourth generation a little later, after all we have so much information about some of these people and they did intermarry with the same families generation after generation."

Time Capsule Suggested

At the Springfield reunion, we discussed an interesting project—a time capsule. As we approach the end of the twentieth century, we have an opportunity to do something as a Society that we have not done before and cannot duplicate for another thousand years. We will leave a historical message for our descendants to unfold and exclaim over fifty years from now.

The Executive Committee asked that we assemble several items special to the Hubbell Family and place them in a time capsule. The capsule will be carefully preserved until it is time to retrieve it and enjoy it in 2050. You, the Hubbell Family, are the ones to say what should go in the time capsule, so let us know! We'd like a couple of things; for instance, we want to know what the capsule should be made of and how big it should be. We need ideas for the contents— remember space and weight when you make your suggestions. How many items should go in it? Where do you think we should place the capsule? What kind of ceremony connected with the placement of the capsule would you like to see performed? It will probably be held late in the year 2000, but we want suggestions about that as well.


