
There were a total of 20 applications for this academic year, five of which were

go directly into the workforce with a job in the public relations field.

Ann comes from Nisswa, MN, the daughter of THFHS member A&R 11527 Platt T. Hubbell and is the granddaughter of Society co-founder and first president A&R 8968 Ernest Hubbell.

Erica C. Hubbell, 19, is an undergraduate in the Nursing program in the School of Arts and Sciences at Alfred State University in Alfred, NY. The 2007 fall term marks the beginning of her second year as a college student, with a GPA of 3.54.

Erica is a 2006 graduate of Margaretville Central School in Margaretville, NY. During high school, she was a member of the National Honor Society and the Scitamard Society (Theatrical Club). "Scitamard" is "dramatics" spelled backwards.

A member of the 2003 soccer team that won the Class D NYS championship. Erica played 4 years of soccer, basketball, and softball. She was also a member of the school band and the chorus.

Erica is the daughter of THFHS member A&R 11706 John C. Hubbell and Cindy Lou Bramley, both of Margaretville.

Justin V. A. Hubbell, 19, is in his words, "a hardy pioneer of the imagination". He credits the members of his family, each one an artist, for where he is today -- studying art at State University of New York (SUNY), New Paltz.

Justin believes that, in spite of the pretentiousness that usually comes from someone in his position (being from a family of artists), he thinks it's best to be humble and have the drive to learn and experience as much as he can within college.

"I'm not simply taking art classes, nor do I just want to get all of my required courses out of the way. I wish to choose each one as though it will help me along the way." Justin credits that way of thinking helped him freshman year and that it's changed him for the better.

Coupled with the importance of academic achievement is Justin's need for enjoyment and fun. He says he's made more friends this year than probably all the years of his life, and it's important for him to keep up with them. Unlike high school where he hung out with the same people every day, Justin says he finds now that he's capable of cooperating and understanding all sorts of people from all

over the world.

At SUNY New Paltz, Justin has worked with an number of groups "to get his hands dirty" on campus policies. Of these groups, he highlights the Student Art Alliance, the NAACP, and working with the campus magazine Fahari/ Libertad as most valuable. Justin believes the effort made in making these connections will ultimately lead to new inspirations in his art.

Currently with a 3.77 GPA, Justin is undecided on which department of art to focus, so he wants to try his hand at all the media he hasn't experienced before. Stuart V. Clark, of Flushing, Michigan, age 82, died Thursday, August 9, 2007 at Heartland Health Care Center-Fostrian. Funeral services were held August 13, 2007 at Riverdale Baptist Church, 5151 Calkins Rd., Flint, with Pastor Jerry Foster officiating. Burial at Easton Cemetery, Owosso, MI.

FIRST FEMALE AERONAUT?

Miss Lucretia Bradley who later married Algernon Sidney Hubbell (#3375) is possibly the first female in America to fly in a hot air balloon. Reports from the *Easton Courier* of 3 February 1855 and the *New York Times* of 8 February 1855 repeat the story.

On 27 January 1855, a crowd from Easton, Pennsylvania and the surrounding area gathered at the Center Square to see the ascension of a balloon. The day was cold and clear and balloon rapidly ascended to a height of two miles and sailed in a southerly direction. On board was Miss Lucretia Bradley a 34 year old woman from New London, Connecticut. She was dressed in a hippodrome costume with a French crown cap, white feather and encircled with a wreath of green and white flowers. As the balloon arrived over a bend in the Delaware River, the spectators watched in horror as gas escaped from the top of the balloon and it made a rapid descent.

In fact, the aeronaut released gas as four heavy currents of air buffeted the balloon. The balloon burst and a part of the balloon and its network formed



a parachute. She threw out the sand used as ballast and a grappling iron and held on to the basket. Lucretia arrived safely in a clover field in Still Valley, New Jersey four miles from Easton.

It is remarkable that this first adventure of hers did not discourage her and she went on to make many more assents including one the next month at the state fair in Elmira, New York. When interviewed in 1898 she said she has spent \$3,000 on a scientific machine to manufacture gas on an improved plan. Her obituary in the Washington Post of 12 March 1907 states that she was the first woman in this country to sail in a balloon.

Second Hubbell Soldier Killed in War On Terror

On 20 June 2007 Darren Patrick Hubbell (#14970) from Jacksonville, FL was killed by a IED in Iraq. Darren was a 38 year old combat medic with the 3rd Infantry Division. His 19 year old son, Darren Patrick Hubbell Jr was wounded by a road side bomb in January. Darren Patrick's grandfather, Clifford Hubbell (12632) was a WWII veteran and is buried in the Florida National Cemetary.

The first Hubbell to die was Cory A Hubbell (15214ae) son of Carl A Hubbell (14858a) of Holly MI and Connie Koelmel. Cory died in Kuait 26 June 2003.

Locals mourn fallen Army medic

Army Sgt. Darren Hubbell was nearly 20 years older than many of the soldiers he served with. He was someone younger troops looked up to. Old enough, in fact, to be the father of a 19-year-old son now serving in Iraq. Now the son who followed his father into combat is in mourning.

Sgt. Hubbell, 38, and three other soldiers, died in Iraq on June 20 when their convoy was struck by a roadside bomb. A combat medic with the Army's 3rd Infantry Division and a veteran of the first Gulf War, Sgt. Hubbell was on his fourth tour of duty in Iraq.

His father and grandmother are longtime Beaches (Florida) residents. "My son was in the initial invasion of Iraq and his brigade was one of the first to take over Baghdad," Gary Hubbell of Jacksonville Beach recalled Thursday. "He liked the military. It was in his blood."

Sgt. Hubbell was a Jacksonville native who attended San Pablo and Jacksonville Beach elementary schools at the Beaches before graduating from Lee High in 1986. He initially served six years in the Army, and then re-upped in 2000 to become an Army medic. Sgt. Hubbell's grandfather, former Jackson-

ville Beach resident Clifford Hubbell, was a World War II veteran who served with the 5th Army Division in Europe.

"When Darren first went into the Army, my husband wrote to him all the time and always encouraged him," Sgt. Hubbell's grandmother, Marion Hubbell of Jacksonville Beach, said. "And when my husband died, Darren took off his medal and put it in his casket." The "medal" Sgt. Hubbell placed in his grandfather's coffin in 1991 at Florida National Cemetery was the combat infantryman's badge (CIB), a decoration synonymous with frontline soldiers. Sgt. Hubbell went on to earn a second CIB in Iraq, along with the combat medical badge and the air assault badge. When he re-enlisted at age 30, he was given his previous rank.

In January, Sgt. Hubbell's son, Pfc. Darren Patrick Hubbell Jr. of the Army's 82nd Airborne Division, was injured in a roadside bomb attack that killed a fellow trooper. He had been in Iraq only two weeks.

Hubbell's father said his son was apprehensive about serving in Iraq, but stuck to the mission at hand. "I tried to talk him out of going back but he said, 'Dad, it's my job,' " the elder Hubbell recalled. "He was frustrated at not being able to shoot at people who were trying to kill him."

"My money would have been on Darren in a firefight," said Sgt. Hubbell's uncle, Kevin Hubbell, a captain with the Jacksonville Fire Department. "But an IED (improvised explosive device) is a coward's weapon."

According to his father, Sgt. Hubbell had remarried in January and was living in Metter, Ga., before being deployed overseas in May. He also has a 13-year-old daughter from a previous marriage.

"He was a good father," Gary Hubbell added. "He served his country, right or wrong. He was a soldier. And that's what he always wanted to be."
